In order to facilitate collaboration between our Conservation and Protection Division and the Mi'gmaq and Wolastoqiyik Wahsipekuk First Nations, we have created an Indigenous Relations Coordinator position.

As an Indigenous Relations Coordinator, you will play an active role in building renewed nation-to-nation relationships.

Wondering what your tasks will look like?

This is a new position, so the mandate may evolve, but essentially you would have to :

- Seek opportunities for collaboration and reconciliation with the Mi'gmaq communities of Gespeg, Gesgapegiag and Listiguj and the Wolastoqiyik Wahsipekuk First Nation
- Serve on committees or working groups and provide the logistics
- Draft protocols and workplans
- Maintain ongoing liaison between the Fisheries Coordinators and Fisheries and Oceans

Desired profile:

- Have a post-secondary diploma or a combination of education, experience and training
- Be bilingual, meaning you must be able to speak, write and read fluently in English and French
- Have given a few information or training sessions
- Have already collaborated, established relationships or engaged in discussions with Indigenous communities or organizations in a professional setting
- Ability to plan, communicate information and demonstrate initiative and integrity
- Be able to write documents, coordinate logistics and facilitate meetings
- Have a valid class 5 driver's license and be willing to travel with the Department's vehicle to meet the communities

Assets :

These skills are not essential but could serve to set you apart in recruiters' eyes.

- Be fluent in a Indigenous language
- Knowledge of the realities of the Mi'gmaq communities of Gespeg, Gesgapegiag and Listiguj and the Wolastoqiyik Wapiti First Nation
- Have relevant experience in commercial fishing, food, social and ceremonial fishing and/or community fishing

Good to know

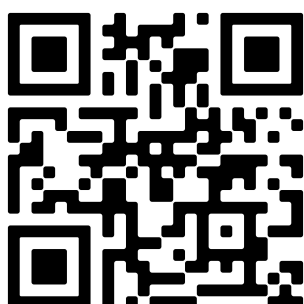
- Possibility of doing part of the tasks by teleworking in hybrid mode
- A moving allowance up to \$5000 may be provided
- All Federal employees must obtain a security clearance

▼ What we put in place to ensure the health and safety of you and your co-workers

- On October 6, 2021, the Government of Canada announced details of its plans to require vaccination across the federal public service.
- As per the new Policy on COVID-19 Vaccination for the Core Public Administration Including the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, federal public servants in the Core Public Administration and members of the RCMP must attest to their vaccination status. The requirement for employees to be fully vaccinated applies whether they are teleworking, working remotely or working on-site. This is a condition of employment and it applies to indeterminate (permanent), determinate (term), casual, and student hiring. Should you reach the point in the selection process where it is necessary to verify terms and conditions of employment then the hiring manager or a human resources representative will contact you in order to complete an attestation.
- All employees of the core public administration are required to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and attest to their vaccination status unless accommodated based on a medical contraindication, religion, or another prohibited ground for discrimination as defined under the Canadian Human Rights Act.
